

Spotlight on a Resident

I started living here in 2004, the year of my stroke. I really like it here (for the most part). Part of why I like it is that I was in a nursing home for a while after my stroke. The staff here is much more stable. Most of the staff have been here multiple years, which means you have a chance to get to know them.

I like the food. The choices we have when we don't like what's on the menu is a nice alternative. Breakfast is the best meal of the day, probably because I have so many choices and I'm so hungry. There are two choices at lunch, plus an a la carte menu with cold sandwiches, hot sandwiches, and salads. There is one choice at supper, plus the a la carte menu. I don't have to cook or clean up!

There are activities going on for most of the day, plus shopping at various places. I can make trips to places like the library and Hobby Lobby. Trips to King Soopers and Walmart are always popular. The bus can take 12. Sometimes it is full. I try to go to my own church. There are also church services here (with free doughnuts)!

I sometimes go to activities, like jewelry making. Other times, I spend time by myself in my room. I like to play games on my computer, read,

watch movies on TV, and tend my plants. I am glad I have my own room. Married couples may share a room.



My mother lives here too. When her dementia gets too advanced for Assisted Living, I can move her to Memory Care. There are only 20 or fewer residents in Memory Care. Everyone gets the care they need. We moved her from Independent Living to Assisted Living at this campus. Thus, she already knew some people and staff.

I recommend this place for anyone who has a reason they can't live independently. There are people here who are 58. Many residents are in their nineties. Most staff and residents are really nice.

I recommend this campus to anyone who needs it for themselves, or has a relative who has a need for more care, to move here. (No, I don't work for marketing!).

Is it time for assisted living?

Many families are dealing with this question. They are noticing that mom or dad, or both, are not maintaining their home like they used to. They are letting more things "slide" as they struggle to keep up. It can be a tricky situation because many seniors are resistant to accepting more help in their home or moving to an assisted living community.

Retirement communities, like the Eastern Star Masonic Retirement Campus, are designed to help seniors with their activities of daily living so the resident can enjoy the day without worry. Staff provide dignified care making the resident feel comfortable with daily activities that they used to do themselves. This includes dressing, bathing, toileting, providing meals, and managing medications. Although the residents are receiving services, they still feel like they are independent.

The biggest fear for seniors is losing their independence.

Most seniors want to stay in their homes, but when it becomes difficult or impossible to live safely, they may not have a choice. This is why it is so important to include them when researching and touring of communities.

Another strategy is to visit a nearby retirement community. Before you do this, however, it is a good idea to do your homework first. Check out the community yourself to make sure it will meet the needs of your loved one.

A good strategy is to bring your loved one for a

fun activity. Then have lunch at the community. This is a non-threatening way to introduce the idea of a different lifestyle to your relative.

If you or someone you know is needing more help, but not on board with receiving assistance, or moving to an assisted living community, a good starting point is to suggest a visit to the doctor to review how safe the senior is without assistance. Hearing advice from a doctor can be very powerful.

Convincing your loved one to move to assisted living can be a challenge, but with the right approach, you can accomplish the task while making everyone happy. For questions on assisted living, or more information on the Eastern Star Masonic Retirement Campus in southeast
