We were all able to benefit from the love, laughter, and connection that we brought to each other. I feel honored to have had the opportunity to get to hear the stories of the people who helped to shape me into who I am today.



My favorite memory from volunteering at my mom's work was during Christmas time. Not all residents have family to spoil them during the holidays, so someone had to. I remember dressing up in my cute little elf costume that my mom made me wear every year. I always said that I hated it, but it was secretly my favorite holiday tradition. We would go door to door delivering "Santa's" gifts. When residents opened up their gifts, the pure joy on their faces lit up the room.

Helping residents feel unencumbered joy gave me purpose. I will always remember getting to listen to their life stories about when they were young, playing my favorite board games with them, and just catching up and sharing my life with them. Most of all, though, I had the pleasure of learning from them. They always had advice to give and wisdom to pass on – sometimes that wisdom had to be shared without my mom around to hear!

The best lesson I learned was to unapologetically be my true authentic self. I know that I have lots to celebrate. I also know that I will continue to learn and grow. All that I can do is my best, and if my best is only a fraction of the residents that helped raise me, then I know I am doing just fine.

# Activities at a Glance


From flu shots to trivia, flower arranging to puzzling, playing Wii, and crafting to reverse trick or treats the residents were BUSY.




# Veterans Day 2024

### Independent Living






























# **Memory Care Recap**
